Golden State Warriors for-Golden State Warriors for-ward Draymond Green serious-ly considered retirement when the NBA suspended him indefi-nitely, but Commissioner Adam Silver talked him out of it, Green said on his podcast, The Draymond Green Show, which was released Monday morning

morning. "I told him, 'Adam this is too "I told him, 'Adam this is too much for me. ... This is too much,' "Green said on the pod-cast. "It's all becoming too much for me – and I'm going to retire.' And Adam said, 'You're making a very rash decision and I won't let you do that.'

"We had a long, great con-versation, Very helpful to me.

versation. Very helpful to me. Very thankful to play in a league with a commissioner like Adam who's more about helping you than hurting you, helping you than punishing you. He's more about the play-ers."

A person with knowledge of e details confirmed to USA

TODAY Sports that Green and Silver had such a conversation. The person requested anonymity because he was not author rized to speak publicly about the exchange.

The NBA lifted the indefinite

suspension on Saturday, but Green did not play in Golden State's loss to Toronto on Sun-

day.

The Warriors are 7-6 in Green's absence, and they are 17-19 overall and in 11th place in the Western Conference. They play New Orleans on Wednes

play New Orleans on Wednesday, but it has not been determined when Green will return to game action.

The NBA suspended Green indefinitely Dec. 18 for "striking Phoenix Suns center Jusuf Nurkic' in the face," during a game the day before.

Penix is perfect for Washington after adversity early in career

Michael Penix Jr. won games at Indiana, and if you stopped there that'd be enough to qual-ify him for a place among the most impressive quarterbacks in recent Football Bowl Subdivi-

sion history.

The long-suffering Hoosiers have three winning seasons since 1995, with two coming with Penix taking the majority of starting snaps: Indiana won eight games in 2019 and six more during the COVID-short-and 2020 season the later the ened 2020 season, the latter the program's most successful year by final ranking since 1967. But it's since leaving Bloom-

ington for Washington that Peington for Washington that Penix has entered a new strato-sphere, etching his place among the most successful quarter-backs of the decade with two seasons that stack up against the best in Pac-12 history.

"Ho's different" "early puning

"He's different," said running back Dillon Johnson. He's "the reason we're in the

spot that we're in," said offen-sive lineman Julius Buelow.

sive lineman Julius Buelow. "He's that guy," wide receiver Rome Odunze said. Penix is special: In his production, in his unorthodox throwing motion, in his place in this record-setting offense and most of all in the way he's overcome injury, the Huskies' senior quarterback has built a name for himself that will outlast for himself that will outlast Monday night, when Washing-ton met Michigan in the College Football Playoff national cham

pionship game. "He's got the 'it' factor," Michigan coach Jim Harbaugh said. "He's just got it."

Overcoming injuries and adversity

No potential championshipwinning quarterback in memo-ry has needed to fight through

ry has needed to ngnt through more on-field challenges.

"He's been through so much different adversity," Odunze said. "I always say, he was at the bottom, he was at the bottom again and here he is at the top, shining in the bigger towners." the biggest moments

One season-ending injury is disappointing; two is heart-breaking. Incredibly, Penix had to overcome four in four years with the Hoosiers, the final two

with the Hoosiers, the final two coming just as his college career seemed to be taking flight. Penix tore his ACL three games into his true freshman season in 2018, with the injury coming as he was splitting time with starter Peyton Ramsey in a close lose to Penn State.

close loss to Penn State. He injured his non-throwing shoulder nine games into the 2019 season, with Indiana sit-

ting at 7-2, matching the Hoo siers' highest win total since 2007. At the time, Penix was completing 68.8% of his throws on 8.7 yards per attempt. He put himself on the map

He put himself on the map during the COVID-19 season, tossing 14 touchdowns through five games before suffering an-other ACL tear in a win against Maryland. Penix led the Hoosiers to a season-opening win against the Nittany Lions – his dive into the end zone for the game-winning two-point con game-winning two-point con-version was one of the high-light-reel plays of the year – fin-ished with 342 yards and three touchdowns in a win against Michigan and went for 491 yards and five scores in a shootout loss to Ohio State. And he suffered another shoulder injury five games into the 2021 season, which saw Pe-nix and Indiana struggle through a winless finish in Big Ten play.

were tough, but it just showed were tough, but it just showed that I can get through anything. I can persevere and push through any hardship that comes my way," said Penix. "But I'm just super blessed to be in this position now. I wouldn't change anything I've been through for anything, I feel like it's shaped me into the player and the negroup that I am today." and the person that I am today."

Indiana offensive coordinator Kalen DeBoer at Washington, Penix has not only remained healthy but rewrote the pro-gram's record book. After lead-ing the FBS in passing yards with 4,641 last season, he en-tered Monday night with 4,648 vards and 35 touchdowns while yards and 35 touchdowns while completing 66.7% of his at-

tempts.

An unorthodox throwing

Just being a southpaw alone makes Penix unique. Only three left-handed quarterbacks have won the national championship in the past four decades: Ala-bama's Tua Tagovailoa, Flori-

da's Tim Tebow and Southern Cal's Matt Leinart. As a prospect, Penix has come under scrutiny for a sidearm throwing motion without many analogs in recent NFL memory, especially from the left side.

But this unorthodox motion also feeds into a release that allows Penix to sling darts that can often surprise defensive backs.

backs.

"The ability to throw the ball with accuracy, he can get rid of it super quick," DeBoer said. "All those pieces from a skill set standpoint and talent-wise are thore." wise are there."

No, the delivery isn't text-book. But the results speak for themselves: Penix threw for a themselves: Penix threw for a combined 621 yards on 8.2 yards per attempt in wins against Oregon, 430 yards against the Longhorns and multiple touchdowns in all but three games.

The perfect fit in an almost perfect offense

Penix has been the perfect fit in a near-perfect offense with no discernible flaws or weak links.

weak links.

The Huskies offensive line won the Joe Moore Award as the top unit in the FBS. Despite that fact, the group was largely seen as a question mark going up against the Longhorns defensive from widely viewed. fensive front, widely viewed as the nation's best. Washington allowed no sacco-one tackle for loss.

Washington's runnir game headed into the match game headed into the match-up with Michigan ranked 127th nationally in carries per game but tied for 26th in the FBS in rushing touchdowns with 28. The Huskies have been partic-ularly effective when closing wins, averaging 4.5 yards per carry when ahead by a single possession and 4.8 yards per carry when leading by two or

more scores.

And the receiver corps is college football's best. Against Texas, Penix made 20 attempts to his four top receivers — Odunze, Ja'Lynn Polk, Jalen McMillan and Germie Bernard and completed 10 with the and completed 19, with the foursome combining for 353 yards and two scores

But Penix is at the center of But Penix is at the center of all Washington does on of-fense. His rapport with DeBoer is obvious; so is his ability to run the entire gamut of De-Boer's pass-heavy playbook. The result has been a dream season for Washington, and a fitting way to conclude one of

fitting way to conclude one of the most unique careers by a quarterback in the playoff era.

"Man, it's a dream come true," Penix said.

The biggest offseason spending spree in baseball history just got even bigger. The Los Angeles Dodgers,

who had already committed who had already committed over \$1 billion in contracts to new players since the end of the 2023 season, added another piece to the puzzle on Sunday by agreeing to terms with free agent outfielder Teoscar Hernandez.

According to multiple media reports, the former Seattle Mariners and Toronto Blue Jaws Sueger will receive

Blue Jays slugger will receive a one-year, \$23.5 million deal. That likely fills the one re-

maining spot the Dodgers were looking to address this offseason after previously

signing two-time American League MVP Shohei Ohtani and highly coveted Japanese pitcher Yoshinobu Yamamoto and acquiring right-hander Ty-ler Glasnow in a trade to bolster this year's roster.

Hernandez, 31, is a two-time Silver Slugger award winner who fills the Dodgers' need for a who fills the Dodgers' need for a right-handed hitting outfielder. Since 2020, he leads the majors with a .626 slugging percentage against left-handed pitchers. Hernandez had his greatest success during the six years he spent with the Blue Jays, in-cluding his lone All-Star season in 2021 when he hit 296 with

in 2021, when he hit .296 with 32 home runs and 116 RBI.

Traded to the Mariners last offseason, he hit .258 26 home runs and 93 RBI in

Four dead, one hurt in hot air balloon crash



A hot air balloon crash in Arizona claimed the lives of four

Eight skydivers survive tragedy in Ariz.

A "heartbreaking" hot air balloon crash in southern Ari-zona over the weekend left four people dead and one critically injured, authorities

Eloy Police Department Eloy Police Department Chief Byron Gwaltney said eight skydivers survived the tragedy in "an empty field in a desert area" of Eloy, a city in Pinal County about 65 miles southeast of Phoenix and 55 miles northeast of Tucson. Shortly after the skydivers completed a jump from the

Shortly after the skydivers completed a jump from the balloon, Gwaltney said, "something catastrophic occurred with the balloon, causing it to crash to the ground." At a news conference, Eloy Mayor Micah Powell reported the balloon had been carrying 13 adults – its operator, four passengers and the eight skydivers.

The impact, Powell said.

The impact, Powell said, took place in "the world's largest drop zone" for skydivers. The cause of the crash was not immediately known Mon-

day.

"But eyewitnesses stated that in the last several sec-

onds of the impact that the material of the hot air balloon was just straight up and down and the impact was fairly large," Powell said.

Five people were inside the gondola when it crashed, offi-cials said, and one died at the scene. Three passengers were taken to a hospital where they later died, Powell said.

"While we continue our efforts, we ask for your thoughts and support for the families and loved ones affected during this difficult time," police said in a statement Sunday.

Houthi missile fired at destroyer downed by US

ship also attacked

U.S. fighter aircraft intercepted and shot down an anti-ship cruise missile fired by Yemen-based Houthi rebels in the

men-based Houthi rebels in the direction of a U.S. Navy destroyer in the Red Sea, the Pentagon said late Sunday.

And a missile fired from Yemen in a separate incident struck an American-owned commercial ship Eagle Gibraltar in the nearby Gulf of Aden, a LIK maritime agency and pri-U.K. maritime agency and private security firm said Monday. Both incidents followed U.S.

and U.K. airstrikes on Houthis and U.K. airstrikes on Houthis in Yemen last week that heightened fears the Israel-Hamas war could lead to a wider war in the Middle East involving the U.S. and its Western allies.
The missile that was fired toward the USS Laboon came from a Houthi-controlled area of Yemen U.S. Central Com-

from a Houthi-controlled area of Yemen, U.S. Central Command said. No injuries or damage were reported.

The U.S. commercial ship, which is Marshall Islands-flagged and owned by Connecticut-based firm Eagle Bulk, was "hit from above by a missile" but remained seaworthy, according to the U.K. Maritime Trade Operations agency, which cited the ship's captain. The ship's name and owner-The ship's name and ownership were identified by Ambrey Limited, a U.K.-based security

Limited, a U.K-based security firm and risk consultancy. The incident with the U.S.-owned ship is still being investigated and no group immediately claimed responsibility for the attack, but suspicion immediately fell on Yemen's Houthi rebels. The Houthis are a rebel group financed, trained and supplied militarily by Iran, Is-

supplied militarily by Iran, Is-rael's arch-enemy. They are also allies of Hamas and have been targeting Red Sea mari-time traffic since November in

Louisiana gardener's 44-pound cabbage sets record for the state

A Louisiana woman set a record for growing the state's largest cabbage, weighing in at more than 44 pounds. Home gardener Jenny

more than 44 pounds.

Home gardener Jenny
Bourg, of Bourg, about an hour
southwest of New Orleans,
grew the giant Sapporo cabbage in her backyard, according to the Louisiana Department of
Agriculture and Forestry.

Bourg, who has been a gardener all of her life, said she
cannot remember a time she
was not planting fruits and
vegetables.

Growing up in a family
where gardening was a way of
life led me to never imagine life
without a garden. As a young

child I can remember being the child I can remember being the garden helper" Bourg told Humans Who Grow Food in an Instagram post. "My mother lived to the age of 90 and I was very fortunate to be able (to) get her wise gardening advice for many, many years."

Bourg grew the giant cabbage from a seed she planted in lab.

When it was harvested on

When it was harvested on Dec. 21, the Department of Agriculture measured the cabbage. It had a circumference of Feet, 2 inches, and weighed 44.115 pounds.
The previous Louisiana state recordholder was Macyn Bertucci, a New Orleans third grade student, who won the competition with a 28-pound cabbage in 2018, according to cabbage in 2018, according to the state agriculture depart-

ment.
"It was huge! I was really surprised," Bertucci told The Market Bulletin.
The Bulletin reported that Bertucci won a \$1,000 savings bond from Bonnie Plant, a greenhouse facility that provides gardeners with fresh fruits, vegetables and succulents.

Although Bertucci and Although Bertucci and Bourg have grown the biggest cabbages recorded in their state, the world recordholder for the heaviest cabbage remains in Alaska.

Scott Robb, a farmer from Palmer, about 40 miles northeast of Anchorage, holds the Guinness World Record for the heaviest chalvage in 2002 it set

heaviest cabbage. In 2012, it set the record at 138.28 pounds.

"There are many reasons to grow a garden. I call it therapy! When I am in my garden, I find myself at peace, and far away from all the business of the world," Bourg told Humans Who Grow Food. "There is nothing that tastes better than your own homegrown vegeta-bles."

To honor her win, Bourg To honor her win, Bourg turned her record-setting cab-bage into casseroles and served it with ham, according to a re-port from the Houma Courier-Thibodaux Daily Comet, part of the USA TODAY Network.

Young Lions, resilient Chiefs triumph

The matchups to determine the participants in Super Bowl 58 are set.

In the early leg of Sunday's divisional round playoff games, the Detroit Lions outlasted the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, bringing the franchise its first conference champinghin appearance in 23 ence championship appearance in 32 seasons. In the late game, a pair of fa-miliar foes in the Kansas City Chiefs and Buffalo Bills renewed their rivalry. And for the host Bills, it was a different, more for the host Bills, it was a different, more painful, renewl: a pivotal field goal inside of two minutes sailed wide right. That means the Lions will travel to Santa Clara, California, to face the San Francisco 49ers and the Chiefs will head to Baltimore in a date with the Ravens in the conference championship, rames the conference championship games next Sunday.

The resilience of the Chiefs

Written off late in the regular season. Written off late in the regular season, right after a stretch when Kansas City lost five of eight games from Weeks 8 through 16, the Chiefs showed, once again, how gritty they are and how dangerous their championship experience

Kansas City went into a hostile envi-

ronment and played almost flawless football. The Chiefs had just two penal-ties enforced for only 15 yards and their lone turnover, a Mecole Hardman fumble into the end zone, was almost devas-

tating.

But the Chiefs defense held and

Kansas City's stars showed up, which Kansas City's stars showed up, which is what championship teams do. Patrick Mahomes had just six incompletions and threw for 215 yards and two scores. Both those touchdowns went to tight end Travis Kelce, who also poured in a team-high 75 yards. The defense completely clamped down on Buffalo's receivers and made Stefon Diggs a non-factor. Turns out the Chiefs can win in the postseason away from Arrowhead, to.

Credit the Lions offense and coordinator Ben Johnson - who appears very likely to end up with a head coaching gig whenever the Detroit offseason arrives for working through early-game adversity. Through their first six offensive

versity. Through their first six offensive possessions (not counting a kneel at the end of the first half), the Lions had recorded three three-and-outs and had crossed midfield just twice.

Then, quarterback Jared Goff started to work the ball down the field. The Lions scored touchdowns on their seventh, eighth and ninth possessions and averaged 8.3 plays and 76 wards in averaged 8.3 plays and 76 yards in those. Tampa Bay and coach Todd Bowles did a tremendous job early of Bowles did a tremendous job early of shutting down the rush, and Detroit's offense stalled. Johnson didn't panic and allowed the pass to open up the rush – namely in a beautifully timed counter that went 31 yards and was a Jahmyr Gibbs touchdown early in the fourth quarter that helped Detroit run away with it.

It's not just that Detroit reached its first NFC title game in 32 seasons, it's also that they've set themselves up for the future, especially on offense. The Lions have a nice trio of emerging stars at running back, receiver and tight end. Jahmyr Gibbs, 21, is a rookie running back who had 114 yards from scrimmage and one Th. On 13 touches Amon-Ra

and one TD on 13 touches. Amon-Ra St. Brown, 24, is already a downfield threat who led the Lions in receiving yards (77) and scored the game-sealing TD. Sam LaPorta, 23, is a rookie tight end who paced Detroit in catches with nine and was a steady threat all day.

Known as a big-game tight end, Tra-vis Kelce did not disappoint. The Bills failed to cover him once Kansas City marched closer to the end zone. Kelce finished with team highs in catches finished with team highs in catches (five), receiving yards (75) and receiving touchdowns (two). Against the Bills, Kelce and quarterback Patrick Mahomes set the NFL record for most post-season touchdowns from a quarterback-receiver duo, with 16, surpassing legendary New England Patriots duo Tom Brady and Rob Gronkowski.
